HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 12th ANNUAL MEETING

The program for the 12th Annual Meeting of the SRDG, to be held in Little Rock, Arkansas October 14-16, 1981, will focus on the theme New Directions for Southern Demography. To highlight this theme, Thursday afternoon will be devoted to a Plenary Symposium on Needed Demographic Research, with Calvin Beale, Leon Bouvier, Gladys Bowles and Everett Lee presenting their thoughts on this subject after which there will be plenty of time for general discussion. A new feature this year will be the Presidential Luncheon which Thomas Espenshade is arranging. There will also be sessions of papers, a panel, and roundtable discussion groups which look at what we know, how we can improve what we are doing, and where we might go in the future. To whet your appetite, a summary of the program reveals the following trends:

1. Demographers are vigorously (ap)plying their trade.
2. Mortality is not a dying issue.
3. The birth rate for fertility papers is down.
4. Migration is still moving our members to research.
5. Titles are undergoing colostomies (i.e. fewer colons) but more surgery is needed.
6. Data on developing countries are being developed.
7. Interest in small areas is not small.

8. There are methodological refinements to our madness as well as very model models.

REVISED SCHEDULE FOR 1980 CENSUS PRODUCTS

Because of budgetary restrictions and other considerations, the planned publication program of the 1980 census is being modified in terms of both extent and timing. The following publications will be available *only in microfiche*: "Block Statistics," "Census Tracts," "Detailed Population Characteristics" and "Metropolitan Housing Characteristics." Thus, those whose interests lie in the realm of small area characteristics will be dependent upon either fiche or computer tape. Additionally, the subject report series will be much curtailed. SLOW GROWTH IN MAJOR METROPOLITAN AREAS

The 32 largest metropolitan areas of the nation, consisting of all those with 1980 populations of at least one million persons, grew by only 6.7 percent during the 1970s, compared with a gain of 18.2 percent during the previous intercensal period. The converse of this dramatic change was evident in figures for the balance of the nation, which showed population growth of 14.5 percent for the 1970s, following a rise of only 9.5 percent in the 1960s. A report on these trends, including intrametropolitan and interregional distribution trends, has recently been prepared by SRDG member Dick Forstall. A limited number of copies of the analysis are available from the Chief, Population Division, US Bureau of the Census, Washington DC 20233.

SRDG MEMBER LINDEN DIES SUDDENLY

Dr. Leonard L. Linden, a demographer in the Department of Sociology at the University of Georgia, died suddenly in Athens, on March 22, 1981. After completing the Ph.D. at the University of Florida in Gainesville, Linden served there as an Assistant Professor of Sociology. He came to the University of Georgia as Associate Professor in 1968 and in the following years taught thousands of students in Introductory Sociology, various courses in Demography, and in the Sociology of Medicine. He was the author and co-author of several articles and book chapters and was a consultant on suicide prevention. He is survived by his widow Marie Frances Cane Linden, and one daughter, Les Lee Linden, both of Athens, Georgia.

ODG PREPARES FOR 2ND ANNUAL MEETING

The Oklahoma Demographics Group will hold its second annual meeting on September 23-25, 1981 at Lake Texoma Resort in Kingston, Oklahoma. The two and one-half day conference will include session topics of interest to both users and producers of demographic data such as: Population Change 1970-1980: A National, Regional, and State Perspective; Metropolitan and Non-Metropolitan Change in the 1970's and Implications for the 1980's; Uses and Production of Demographic Data: Private and Public Sector; State, County, and Local Estimates and Projections; and Computers, Demographic Data and Data Management in the 1980's. Other items to be discussed are: a national publication on applied demographic research (see article this issue), the Census Bureau and budget constraints, and a state demographic research agenda for the 1980's.

GEORGIA DEMOGRAPHIC DISCUSSION GROUP

The Demographic Discussion Group in Athens, Georgia, held several meetings in the 1980-81 academic year, on a wide variety of topics. In November, Clyde B. McCoy and James E. Rivers of the Center for Social Research on Drug Abuse at the University of Miami discussed "Some Consequences of Cuban Immigration to the United States." Abbott L. Ferriss of the Department of Sociology at Emory University presented a paper on "Research Developments in Social Indicators" at the December meeting. In January, Gladys K. Bowles of Bowles Demographic Research discussed "What the Preliminary 1980 Census Figures Can Tell us About Population Changes in Georgia." Elaine Weeks of the Department of Sociology at the University of Georgia presented a paper on "The Depression Born Cohort: A Social History and Demographic Portrait" at the meeting in February. Yongsock Shin also of the University of Georgia reviewed his dissertation findings in March, "Homicide in the United States, 1903-75: A Demographic Study." The April discussion was devoted to "The Impact of Migration to the South on the Politics of the Region," with Robert H. Freymeyer of the Department of Social Sciences at Lander College in Greenwood, South Carolina, presenting some results of recent research. The final meeting of the year, held in May, featured Davor Jedlicka of the Department of Sociology at the University of Georgia discussing "The Demography of Coastal Georgia" based on his research associated with the Georgia Office of Sea Grants.

ESTIMATES OF THE VETERAN POPULATION

The Veterans Administration (VA) has recently issued the September 1980 version of its semi-annual report entitled "Veteran Population by Age, State of Residence and Regional Office, by Period of Service" as well as the more detailed "State and County Veteran Population, September 1979". The latter publication is prepared every two or three years. POPULATION COUNCIL FELLOWSHIPS FOR 1982-83

The Population Council has announced its fellowship program for 1982-83. Three types of awards are offered: graduate, post-doctoral, and mid-career. Preference is given to women and/or applicants from developing countries who have a firm commitment to return to their home country upon completion of training. The awards, which are made for a period of up to one year, are contingent upon admission by a training or research institution with a strong program in population studies. APPLIED DEMOGRAPHIC PUBLICATION TO BE DISCUSSED AT SRDG MEETING

In the past few years there has been some discussion of the need for a publication devoted to applied demographic research. In spite of the recent appearance of *American Demographics* magazine and the existence of such journals as *Growth and Change* and the *Review of Public Data Use*, this feeling of need is still being expressed.

Articles would describe and analyze demographic phenomena, examine methods and techniques of producing demographic data and discuss theoretical issues. All levels of geographic research will be investigated. Reports targeted to small area demography will be featured. The publication's audience will be comprised of persons from areas such as public sector planning, market research, and academia.

The pro's and con's of the proposed publication were discussed at some length at PAA as well as other meetings. However, there are still many unanswered questions. In order to properly address some of these and generate a dialogue on the potential benefits of such a periodical, an open forum meeting will be held the Thursday evening of this year's SRDG meeting in Little Rock. Anyone interested in discussing any aspect of the endeavor is asked to attend. Information on the specific time and place will be found on the SRDG message board at the conference. A NEW CCSP UPDATE PROVIDES CENSUS-RELATED CURRICULUM IDEAS

A 20-page assortment of census-related curriculum ideas and materials has been published by the Census Bureau's College Curriculum Support Project (CCSP) in *CCSP Update No. 4*. Three major topics are considered in this issue: new census publications; a brainteaser; and a collection of census-related instructional resources. Published occasionally, two to three times a year, the *CCSP Update* strives to give college instructors new information related to teaching students about census data.

"What 1980 Census Data Will Be Available for Fall Classes?" highlights new census publications. Also, discussed is the forthcoming publication of *CENSUS '80: Projects for Students*, a booklet with exercises or classroom activities designed to involve students in the use of census data.

A brainteaser is presented to help students develop table-reading skills. In this instance, a misinterpretation of data from the new *State and Metropolitan Area Data Book, 1979* is examined.

Finally, a 10-page annotated bibliography summarizes published census-related instructional activities, case studies, and journals.
