TEXAS DATA USERS MEET

A group of more than 50 people met recently in Dallas to form the first chapter of the Texas Economic and Demographic Association (TEDA). According to Mike Chism, a researcher with a Dallas bank who spearheaded the organizational effort, the purpose of this new organization is "to develop contacts among demographic and economic data users; to stay current on the latest demographic and economic data; to utilize the organization to further each member's technical knowledge....(and) to promote procedures that minimize duplication of effort among demographers and data users".

The initial meeting was attended by a cross-section of persons representing the public, private and academic sectors of the Dallas/Fort Worth community. POPULATION FORECASTING REPORT

Forecasting State Population Using ARIMA Time Series Techniques by Paul Voss, Charles Palit, Balkrishna Kale and Henry Krebs has recently been published by the Applied Population Laboratory at the University of Wisconsin (Technical Series 70-6, 1981, 222 pages). This report presents the detailed findings of an investigation designed to examine the utility of ARIMA time-series models for forecasting state populations. Time-series forecasts based on data originating in 1930, 1950, 1964 and 1970 are compared with projections of state populations derived from other projection techniques. CENSUS BUREAU TRAINING COURSES

The U.S. Bureau of the Census will offer five kinds of training courses for data users, as summarized below. For more information, please contact the Data User Services Division, User Training Branch, U.S. Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233. Telephone (301) 899-7645. Application and payment must be received 4 weeks prior to the start of the course.

1) Introduction to Geography, Geocoding and GBF/DIME Files.

This course covers the basics of census geography, maps and geographic coding schemes. The content and structure of GBF/DIME files, geocoding concepts and computer mapping techniques and software are treated in detail. This course will be offered on April 20-22 in Denver and May 25-27 in Washington, D.C. Fee is \$75.

2) Introduction to Population Estimates Methodology.

This course covers the methods used to make population estimates for states, counties, cities and small areas. It will be offered on April 19-23 in Atlanta. Fee is \$125.

3) Census Bureau Statistical Resources for Librarians.

This course provides detailed information on the programs, products and services available from the Census Bureau and other selected federal offices. It will be offered on May 17-20 in Washington, D.C. Fee is \$100.

4) 1980 Census Machine-Readable Data Products and Software.

This course provides a technical introduction to 1980 census summary statistics files, microdata files and the CENSPAC software package. It is designed for users with some computer background. It covers subject content, file structure, record format, computer software and data dictionaries. This course will be offered on February 23-24 in Atlanta, March 9-10 in Los Angeles, May 4-5 in Detroit and June 15-16 in Washington, D.C. Fee is \$50.

5) Statistical Resources from the Census Bureau

This course provides a comprehensive overview of the statistical resources and data user services offered by the Census Bureau and other federal agencies. It covers the kinds of data available, the geographic areas for which data are tabulated and the methods for locating specific items in Census Bureau reports. It will be offered on March 22-25 and June 21-24 in Washington, D.C. Fee is \$100.

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COMMENTARY

January is traditionally a time for taking stock and considering the state of our union. After a year of independence, SRDG appears to be thriving. The transition so ably begun by Gladys Bowles and implemented by Thomas Espenshade has shown us that our vitality can continue without institutional backing. Having demonstrated that, we should examine how well we are meeting our stated purposes. That we are doing well as a channel of information is attested to by the attendance (noteworthy in a year of budgetary exigencies and general uncertainty) and the quality of the papers at our Little Rock meetings. Our Newsletter continues to provide material for SRDG members and other (and older) newsletters. We can probably argue that our membership is generally advancing demographic research and training in the South.

What we need to strengthen, however, is our commitment to encouraging multidisciplinary studies of population trends. Faced with delays, deletions, and other disappointments, demographers have had a discouraging year. The start of 1982 finds us with little to analyze from the 1980 Census, curtailments in other data gathering efforts, and major cutbacks in academic and government funding for research. All this comes at a time when technology puts computers at every neophyte's fingertips and when the applications of demography are widely recognized. We must, therefore, cross not only disciplinary lines but institutional ones to assure that our talents and resources are combined to meet these new challenges. The Board of Directors welcomes your suggestions on how SRDG can facilitate this.
