## FINAL CALL FOR PAPERS FOR 1982 SRDG MEETING

The thirteenth annual meeting of the SRDG will be held in Greensboro, North Carolina, on October 6-8, 1982. The theme for the meeting is "Public Policy in the Eighties: Uses and Analyses of Demographic Data". The meeting will include a presidential luncheon focusing on the policy implications of demographic change in the South, poster sessions on applied demography (see following article), round table luncheon/discussions on various topics and the usual full slate of panels and contributed paper sessions.

Members of the SRDG and other interested persons are invited to submit papers dealing with any topic of demographic interest. Papers with an applied as well as academic viewpoint are welcome. The SRDG board of directors convened a lunch meeting in San Diego on April 29. Items on the agenda included the archivist report, membership report, financial report, discussion of future meeting sites and a report from the committee on applied demography. Formal action was taken on two matters:

## POSTER SESSIONS AT 1982 SRDG MEETING

In addition to the regular sessions of contributed papers, the 1982 SRDG meeting will include a number of poster sessions. These sessions will consist of information displayed in poster-size format. Each session will be assigned a two-hour time slot when the presenter is available to discuss the presentation. Poster sessions are particularly effective for presentations on such demographic topics as techniques, methods, mapping and other types of graphics. Persons interested in making this type of presentation should submit an outline listing the elements in their display along with a paragraph describing the substantive content. The Program in Population Planning has an interdisciplinary faculty oriented towards population issues, both domestic and international, with a special focus on policy and family planning programs. Requirements: doctoral degree in one of the social, health or management sciences, demonstrated research competence and a substantive interest in one or more of the following: communication or counselling in family planning programs, social psychology of fertility, family sociology, demographic behavior or program evaluation. Trainees will attend a weekly Demography of Aging seminar and will participate in demographic research concerning the older population of the United States. ## SUMMER WORKSHOPS

Census Analysis Workshop. The Applied Population Laboratory at the University of Wisconsin will sponsor a workshop on "Producing Applied Demographic Publications" in Madison, Wisconsin on July 8 and 9, 1982. This workshop is designed to help people prepare and present technical data in an effective and understandable way. Participants will learn about recent demographic trends and ways to communicate them to non-technical audiences; techniques for analyzing and interpreting data for presentation or publication; data available from the 1980 census and other sources; the art of graphic presentation; and several other topics. Two special sessions will focus on "Patterns of Growth: Migration and Population Redistribution" and "Families and Households: Changes in the Way We Live". Resource persons include Glenn Fuguitt, Paul Voss and Stephen Tordella of the Applied Population Laboratory; Greer Litton Fox of Wayne State University; and Annabel Kirschner Cook of Washington State University. Longitudinal Data Analysis Workshop. The National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago will sponsor a workshop on longitudinal data analysis in Chicago from July 12-16, 1982. This workshop is designed to give 50 researchers a chance to learn recently developed methods for analyzing longitudinal data. Topics covered include: Markov chains; heterogeneity and state dependence in panel data; stability of individual differences; dynamic selection bias; labor market and earnings dynamics applications; general hazard functions; nonparametric heterogeneity models; time aggregation; and applications to social networks, labor markets and demography. Lectures will be given by Burton Singer of Columbia University, James Heckman of the University of Chicago and Christopher Flinn of the University of Wisconsin. Participants are expected to have a solid background in multivariate analysis and probability theory. The fee for the workshop is \$100 and the deadline for application is June 1. I'd like to use my stint as guest columnist for the Newsletter to ask two favors of all SRDG members. First, toward the end of the summer, I will be conducting the second SRDG membership survey; the information provided on the questionnaire will be used to prepare an updated membership directory. I would like to be able to distribute the directory during the 1982 meeting [October 6-8 in Greensboro, NC]. The survey form will be included in the annual special mailing, which also includes dues renewal notices, meeting preregistration forms, and ballots for the Board election. In order to meet the deadline, I will need everyone's cooperation. The directory can be no more complete or useful than the membership makes it. Please help and return your questionnaire as soon as you can. Because of the short amount of time between the date of the mailing and the printer's deadline, it will not be possible to send any follow-up request.

The second favor concerns what I feel is a rather high rate of non-renewal of membership to SRDG - about a fourth of all persons on the membership roster at the end of last summer did not respond to the two dues solicitations.

While I recognize that no organization can be all things to all persons, I remain concerned that such a high non-renewal rate persists despite extraordinarily low dues and registration fees and an annual meeting which seems to be enjoyable and rewarding to nearly everyone who attends. If anyone has specific suggestions of ways which SRDG can better serve its membership, I would be most happy to receive them.
