Featured Speakers Named for Upcoming Annapolis Meeting

Martha (Marty) Riche, former Director of the Census, will present "Census 2000: How We Got From There to Here," at the Friday, October 30 luncheon.

Dr. Riche began her career in 1961 as an economist with the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In 1978, she became a founding editor of *American Demographics*, the nation's first magazine devoted to interpreting demographic and economic data for corporate and public executives. In 1991, Dr. Riche became Director of Policy Studies for the Population Reference Bureau. At PRB, she focused on building a bridge between the research and policy-making communities. Dr. Riche then served as Director of the Census from October 1994 to January 1998. Now back in private life, she lectures, writes, and consults on a wide range of socioeconomic changes affecting the US and its population.

Peter Morrison, RAND Corporation, will present "Adventures in Applied Demography," at the Saturday, October 31 luncheon.

Dr. Morrison is a resident consultant with RAND and the founding director of its Population Research Center. His principal interests are applications of demographic analysis in tracking consumer markets; monitoring and forecasting local demographic trends; and litigation support in such areas as voting rights, employment, and housing. Dr. Morrison has served as advisor to the National Academy of Sciences, the Committee for Economic Development, the

National Institute of Child Health and Human Services, the Congressional Research Service, the Bureau of the Census, the California Governor's Council on Growth Management, and United Way. Through his demographic consulting services firm, he conducts executive briefings on demographics and business for private sector clients.
